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## Playwrite's Notes

A play should be bigger than life, so maybe my compadres and comadres represent something bigger than our daily existence. Not all compadres are putting the movida on their comadres, like Iggy. But Ignacio is bigger than life, full of drive and ambition, and he still thinks he's twenty. He's a macho who covers up his emotions, and yet deep inside he has a heart of gold.

I wrote the play as a comedy, but beneath the humor lurks a deep emotional issue that we seldom discuss. El cambio de los middle years. We feel young, we have ganas, but Mother Nature is insisting that we change our course in life. During this time, cariño is enough to sustain relationships, but the ugly macho doesn't know this. Don't be an ugly macho.
